FULL SESSION SUMMARY – God at Work in the World Through His Church: The Suffering Church

and Religious Freedom

STATEMENT OF THE ISSUE/ PROBLEM: The suffering church and religious freedom

REGIONAL FOCUS: Asia

KEY POINTS:

*The gospel is a bridge to the people of Asia *Lausanne wants the best for China and its people

*A young woman saw her father persecuted, yet she desires to go back and share Christ

Evangelicals make up 3.5 percent of the population in Asia.

<u>South Korea:</u> One-fifth of the population is Christian. Today there are churches in all 20 provinces. <u>China:</u> Since churches per se are not in China, unless listed with the government, the house churches were only the way for Christianity to survive. The Chinese delegation could not come to Lausanne. In their absence, they sent several Scriptures that they were praying for us here at Lausanne which were: Phil 1: 29 and 2 Cor. 6: 3-10. Doug Birdsall closed out the special emphasis on China by stating that Lausanne wants the best for the church in China and for the nation. There was also an emphasis placed on Pakistan and India. A Pakistani woman sang a solo in Urdu.

India: One billion people, 300 million of whom belong to the higher society; four million Hindus, consisting of different castes, by marriage, food, purity and pollution. Over 54% of Indians are classed as working poor class; women are treated as the very low of the lowest. There is a growing movement of the Holy Spirit among the different castes. He reported that in the different offices people are hearing of Jesus and as a result they are being brought into the Kingdom. How are they reaching this lost country? They are pursuing reconciliation across tribes, castes, etc. "The gospel becomes a bridge to our people; pray that millions will surrender to Jesus Christ and discipleship will be taking place across our nation."

Korea: The young woman who spoke was only six years old when she saw her family persecuted for political reasons. They were able to escape to China "where relatives led my family to church." They later came to know Jesus. Her father became a missionary in N. Korea. He was arrested and put in prison for three years. In those days of separation from his family he cried out to God to grow him spiritually, rather than complain. He returned to N. Korea to share the love of Jesus to people in his homeland which was a dangerous land. In 2006 he was again put in prison and she has not heard from him since. She went on to say, "I had a dream and saw the Lord and heard him say, 'Why are you not coming to me, why are you turning away? Please come and follow me. Just as your earthly father loved you, I love you more.' I too came to know Jesus. And as a result, I hope to honor my earthly father and my heavenly father, by becoming a missionary and returning to tell the North Korea people about Jesus."

God is moving on the continent of Asia. Since 1950, Christianity has grown one hundred fold in countries such as Nepal, Mongolia, China, and Central Asia.

In Asia, Christianity is not the largest religion. Islam and Buddhism are dominant faiths. Yet South Korea, with some of the largest churches in the world, is the second largest missionary sending nation. Even in China, house churches continue to grow and abandoned church buildings are being reopened. Yet in some Central Asia countries, the church does not yet have a significant role.

Christianity is still trying to find its place in Muslim countries where public opinion often considers Christianity a form of western influence over the population. Another challenge is how sister churches around the world can partner and support the churches in Asia.

The final scenes were taken from the 1989 Lausanne II Congress held in Manila, Philippines where the Chinese delegation was not allowed to attend. Rows of empty chairs served as reminders to pray for our Chinese brothers and sisters and believers in other nations who were not represented.

- 1. What are some of the challenges Christianity faces in contexts where it is not a majority religion?
- 2. How might believers overcome public suspicion that Christianity influences culture in a negative way? How is Christianity penetrating your community with grace and truth?
- 3. How can Christians partner with believers in Asia where Christianity is a minority religion?

The Church of China was not represented at Lausanne 1989. In the last days, China was unable to attend Cape Town 2010. The absent Chinese delegates instead sent Scripture verses. The song they were to sing is presented to the Lausanne participants. And an empty seat at the table is offered from the Lausanne participants to their Chinese brothers and sisters even in their physical absence.

- 1. How can the church support and respond to her brothers and sisters from countries with oppressive governments and religious discrimination?
- 2. What lessons might the Lord want to teach us as we reflect on those who have limited political or religious freedom?



TOPIC: The Suffering Church and Religious Freedom **SEGMENT TITLE:** Testimony of a Young North Korean Woman

A young woman is born into a North Korean family. Due to political persecution, they must flee to China. After her parents come to faith in Jesus Christ, her father returns to North Korea and is imprisoned. Despite his oppression, he shares Christ with those who live without hope.

The young woman came to faith during her father's second imprisonment. Though her father disappeared, her strong desire is to continue in the footsteps of her parents and proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ to the lost people of North Korea.

- 1. In what ways are you encouraged by the faith of this young Korean woman and her parents?
- 2. Rather than choose a life of freedom, some choose a more dangerous path. What factors cause a person to choose the more difficult road?
- 3. How can we best prepare our young people to face the challenges ahead of them?

SEGMENT TITLE: The Church in India - Richard Howell and Dinesh Kumar

India is a country where culture and religion create an immovable social structure of discrimination and inequality. Richard Howell and Dinesh Kumar describe how the society in India deprives people of hope. The caste system condemns millions to lives of misery and exploitation.

Balija is the story of an Indian ruler who promoted equality, dignity, and justice to the members of the lower castes. Balija is used as a way of explaining the liberty and fulfillment that one can have in Jesus. It is the dream of church leaders for the power of the Holy Spirit to bring transformation to the country of India.

- 2. How can Christians defy those structures through the Gospel of Jesus Christ?
- 3. Are there areas in your community where the gospel of Jesus is needed to proclaim freedom and dignity for humanity?
